What we've been doing this term...

Building home-school links

Our big focus this year is on giving families more opportunities to come into school and see what we've all been doing - and, looking back over the term, this has been a great success! We've had more events than ever before, with parents and carers joining in with Maths Workshops in Year 3/4, Crumble Making in Y1, Stay & Read sessions



in Years 2 and 5, World War 2 Day in Year 5/6, Stay & Plays in Early Years and a host of other activities. A big thank you to everyone who's dropped in for one of these sessions - we hope it helped you to better understand what we've been learning about in class, and given a few ideas for things you could try at home.



Getting together

Within school, we've also had lots of opportunities to get together and celebrate all that we've achieved this term. Key Stage 1's fantastic production of *Baubles* was a big hit in the penultimate week of term (more on that over the page), and we loved getting together to share songs performed by every class on

the last day of term. Earlier in the Autumn, our Halloween Disco was attended by over 120 children and raised more than £500 for School Council funds (and gave us all a fantastic opportunity to get into our scariest costumes!)

Supporting good causes

Our final set of events has seen us supporting a variety of good causes that are important to us and to our school community. Our Bake Sale for Macmillan Cancer raised £149, our Children in Need non-uniform day collected £230, and we raised £130 for this year's Poppy Appeal. Best of all, our massive Christmas Fayre made £1525 for School Council, who are raising money for a Trim Trail on the field.

Early Years

This term has been an exciting start to the year as there were many celebrations and religions to learn about. We had a fantastic time learning about Black History Month, Diwali, Halloween and Christmas.

We have loved our Talk for Writing story this term, which was Owl Babies. We thought of and wrote new words to describe the owls, created our own owls using different media and materials and even created our own story maps to re-tell and innovate on the story.

We were very lucky to visit two special places this term. Ladybirds enjoyed a day at Church Farm, while Butterflies travelled to Herrings Green Farm. Ladybirds explored all the farm animals and learnt new facts from the farmer Jill. They also collected eggs, fed the farm animals and helped to plant new seeds. Butterflies saw a variety of owls and even got to hold one. We also watched a flying show and were able to meet other animals such as rabbits, tortoises, goats and snakes!

























Year 1: Fieldmice

In art we have looked at a number of different artists that use natural materials to create their artwork, including Andy Goldsworthy, Lois Ehlert and Guiseppe Arcimboldo. We had lots of fun exploring and creating in these different styles, using natural objects we found in both our forest and in our local park.

In maths we have been focussing on number. We have used part-part-whole templates and tens frames to help us add and subtract using these numbers. We have also looked at doubling and halving numbers to 20.

Linked to our work on instructions in English we took part in a brilliant crumble making workshop with our families. We worked together to follow instructions, mix ingredients, peel and chop fruit - and then taste our fantastic crumbles!

We finished the term with our Christmas show. We were so proud that so many of you were able to come and watch us, and we hope you enjoyed it as much as we did!























Year 1/2: Dormice

In English this term we began by learning the story of Little Charlie, which led into us creating our own journey stories. Later in the term, we moved onto instructions, learning how to make Grandma's pizza by following a model text carefully, practicing using and giving other instructions and eventually writing our own. Our main focus has been on letter formation and making sure that we are all writing in complete sentences.

We have all enjoyed going to Forest School every Friday. We have used all our superhero powers in a number of activities. We've made group mandalas, log dogs, been on a colour hunt and learnt about the forest environment. 
Year 2: Hedgehogs

The solution


We need to stop using our cars to come to school if we can. To do this, we could try:


- Ask our parents to choose other ways to travel to school like walking, scootering or riding a bike.

- Making roads and crossings safer with more traffic lights and lollipop people.




We need to stop using cars and give children the choice of how they get to school. This needs to stop NOW!!!



Year 4: Moles




LAUREN THE WARRIOR

Year 5/6: Eagles

























Year 5/6: Falcons

Sports Update

Football

Our Football season kicked-off with the Stevenage Schools FA Autumn Tournaments, which we hosted at Bedwell. Our girls were in action first, taking on teams from 11 other schools. With many of the team playing their first competitive game, they performed really strongly, with Ebonie particularly impressing in defence as they secured two draws and two losses in their group, which wasn't quite enough to make it through to the knock-out stage. A week later, it was the turn of the boys. They played some excellent football, with Riley excelling in goal and Jacob putting in strong performances in midfield, but they struggled to score and went out in the group stage. Since then, the boys have worked hard in training and have really come together as a group, winning in the first round of the Stevenage Cup and securing their first win in the league as well. Finally, our Year 3/4 team kicked-off their season with a friendly against Ashtree School. Again, this was the first competitive game that more than half of the team had played - so it was great to see the confidence and determination with which they kept on driving forwards, resulting in great goals from Chance and Toby. All three teams are really keen to get playing again as soon as the field defrosts and the grass reappears in the spring!

Netball

Both our Girls and Mixed Netball squads have been in action this term, with tough league games against Ashtree, Codicote and St Ippolyts. It was brilliant to see the grit and determination with which both teams have approached every game, doubling their efforts when the going got tough and even battling on when the early nights meant that they had to finish some of their matches in near-darkness! As a result of all of that, they have had great success, winning two and losing one of their games and showing some impressive form that will put them in contention for medals at the end of the season!

We've taken part in a host of other events across the course of the term. Our Year 3/4 tennis squad collected silver medals after finishing second in the



Stevenage Tennis Tournament. 21 children from Year 5 and 6 took part in the Stevenage Cross Country Festival, with the Year 5 boys team placing 4th overall. We have also been in action in Rowing and Dodgeball events organised by Stevenage Sporting Futures. Finally, our clubs have been running throughout the term, offering free opportunities to play football, netball, dodgeball, cricket and a variety of other sports after school every day.
