## What we've been doing this term...

#### Fundraising Success!

This year, we've been working hard to raise money for a new Trim Trail for the school field. This includes a collection of wooden climbing, balance and agility equipment that we will be able to use at lunch and playtimes. The tricky bit is that



it's expensive - so our fundraising target for the year was £14,000 (far more than we have ever made before in a single year.)

Well, we've reached the end of the year, and there's only one way to put this: we smashed our target! We now have over £16,000 in our School



Council Fund, and have been able to order a shiny new Trim Trail, which is due to be installed in August! This has all come about as a result of the way we've worked together as a community this year. We've raised money through discos, fayres, our Dance-a-thon, uniform sales, hiring the school out during the holidays - and we've also received £5500 from the Stevenage Educational Trust and £2500 from the Follet Trust.

One of the biggest steps towards our fundraising target came through our Summer Fayre, which took place on June 22nd. We piled out onto the field

after school for a fantastic afternoon of games, competitions, food, drink and bouncy-castle fun. Thanks to all of the donations that had come in during the week leading up to the Fayre, our tombolas were piled high with prizes, while Mrs Linsdell's hard work had secured an amazing collection of raffle prizes. At the end of the afternoon, we added up the takings and were amazed to find we had raised £1800 - enough to (almost) fill our fundraising totaliser!






























# Y6's PGL Adventure

It was interesting to read the signs and find out what animal group each creature belonged to, what they ate and which continent they came from. We could remember lots of these facts when we got back to class, and were really keen to talk about the animals we had met.

In art we have explored African Art and loved sharing our 'Come and Make' session with you. This linked in with our work in geography, where we have looked at the natural and physical features of the UK, and then compared these with the features of Kenya. We also learnt to find and name the 7 continents on a map.

In maths, meanwhile, we have been learning to tell the time using o'clock and half past the hour, and learning to count in multiple of 2s, 5s and 10s. We have also explored fractions, finding halves and quarters.

We finished off the term with our forest day. We learnt a variety of new skills and made lots of natural crafts. The afternoon was topped off with den building out on the field, followed by the chance to roast marshmallows on the fire to make smores.

We also made our own Anglo-Saxon medallions or coins and really loved adding jewels and embellishments.

### Tring Museum

We had a great day out on our trip to Tring Natural History Museum, gaining loads of information about the different types of animals found on planet earth. We were exceptionally well behaved and the museum staff really enjoyed showing us a variety of animal teeth and skulls. We also had the opportunity to select an animal of our choice to draw and study, which we absolutely loved - it's not every day you get to sit face to face with a tiger or polar bear!

### **Explanations**

# **English**: Explanations


#### Why do pirates have beards?

















# Eagles & Falcons


We ended the term with an emotional final assembly, reflecting on all that we have achieved during our time at Bedwell and looking forward to the amazing adventures that lie ahead!













# Sports Update

### **Athletics**

In early June our top athletes from years 4, 5 and 6 headed to Ridlins Stadium for this year's Stevenage Athletics Festival. It was a great day out, giving our team the opportunity to both take on the best runners,



jumpers and throwers in town, and to compete on a proper running track (in many cases for the first time). With 19 schools and almost 350 children involved, the standard of competition was really high, but we gave it our all in every event, and we were particularly proud of Aleena (ball throw) and Cairo (long jump), who both won bronze medals. Even more impressively, when all the scores were added up, we discovered that we had finished in 4th place overall, just missing out on the team medals.

#### Netball

It was a packed end to the school netball season, with both our Girls and Mixed teams working hard to complete all of their fixtures in time and finish as high as possible in the league table. Our Girls team took on Camps Hill, St Margaret's, St Nicks and Shephalbury Park in a series of tight, tough games, and finished in 7th place overall in the Stevenage league. Our Mixed team, meanwhile, went into their last game against St Ippolyts with everything to play for - and put in an awesome all-around team performance to win the game and go level on points with two other schools. The final league positions were decided on goal difference, where our sportsmanship (not running up big scores when we were winning) unfortunately went against us, and we finished as bronze-medallists (but joint first on points!)

#### Year 3/4 Football

We finished off the football season with the Stevenage Schools FA Year 3/4 Tournament, which we hosted at Bedwell. Playing against some very talented, very organised players, goals were hard to come by - but with
